My sabbatical is now only 6 weeks away! The first week will be spent hiking the St. Cuthbert Pilgrimage trail between Melrose, Scotland and Lindisfarne on the English west coast (62 mi).

Pilgrimage is an ancient and widespread practice. In the book of Psalms, there is a collection of Pilgrim Psalms found from 120-134. The Jewish

people would sing these as they walked to Jerusalem to the temple. They are called "Song of Assents" because Jerusalem was on a high plateau and so you "went up to Jerusalem." Psalm 122:1-4 says, "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord!' Our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem. Jerusalem - built as a city that is bound firmly together. To it the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord,..." It is likely Mary, Joseph and Jesus sang this psalm on their way to Jerusalem.

I can remember reading the Canterbury Tales in high school. In Chaucer's tale some 30 characters journey to Canterbury to visit the martyr Thomas Becket's shrine and grave. They all came from different backgrounds and all have their own reasons for going, some better than others. Among the group where religious types like a monk, nun, and priest. There was a soldier, a knight who had fought in the crusades. There was a miller and the knights' servant. There was a merchant, a sailor, a philosopher, someone from a college, a physician and a lawyer. From the 6th century through the Middle Ages right up to the Reformation in the early 16th century all kinds of people made pilgrimages to various cathedrals, shrines and holy places in the British Isles. The Protestant Reformation put an end to all this.

Pilgrimages have staged a comeback in more modern times. In Spain over 275,000 people a year travel Camino de Santiago, one of the most famous pilgrimage routes the world. Of course you can hike a pilgrim trail to just enjoy the scenery or to be a spiritual tourist. T.S. Eliot speaks of a more profound reason to visit ancient shrines in his Four Quartets. He writes: " If you came this way, Taking any route, starting from anywhere, At any time or at any season, It would always be the same: you would have to put off Sense and notion. You are not here to verify, Instruct yourself, or inform curiosity Or carry report. You are here to kneel Where prayer has been valid.

In Scotland and England I will be visiting ancient Christian sites, some from as far back as the 6th century. I'll be walking on the same ground ancient saints walked. I'll visit ancient shrines where saints bones lie. Hopefully, with the Holy Spirit's help, I'll do so with a sense of "kneeling where prayer has been valid."

# Family Promise Guests Arrive July 14!! You Are Needed

Sunday evening, July 14, our Family Promise guests will arrive at Baese Hall for a two week stay with our congregation. We will provide a safe place for these families to stay, showing the gracious hospitality that we are called to share as members of Christ's church.

This year several members who usually volunteer to host will be out of town or otherwise unable

to participate. That means others of our congregation can be especially helpful volunteers this month. Here are ways you can help:

- 1. Sign up for one or two overnights, arriving at 7 after dinner and leaving by 7 in the morning as guests return to work or the day center, checking the on-line sign up for available nights
- 2. Arrive at Baese Hall around 5:30 any evening to entertain the children or visit with guests as dinner is prepared. A fun craft is always popular with the children.



- 3. Arrive at Baese Hall about 6:00 after the meal to entertain the children, visit with family members until bedtime or until the overnight volunteer/s arrive about 7 p.m.
- 4. Bring a board game or activity you feel children would enjoy, marked with your name
- 5. Sign up to bring items for families to use to fix bag lunches: lunch meats, cheese, peanut butter, cookies, fruit drinks, individual snack bags, bottled water.
- 6. Come early on the final Sunday to help pack up beds, sort sheets and bedding into bags for Faith Church members to take home to launder, clean kitchen, and set up for after-church pot luck
- 7. Take home a bag of laundry on the last Sunday to return for our next hosting opportunity in December.

The heaters I can't trust with the electricity...It happened already two times it caught fire...so I stopped putting

heaters. I just use my gas stove and I managed."

Tina's face lights up when she imagines living in her new Habitat House. "I'll be safe and secure knowing that I don't have to worry about nothing anymore. My favorite room will be the living room, looking out the window and adoring it. I'd really like to be outside looking in...looking at my house through the outside just adoring it for hours, walking around my house, going inside the living rooms, my rooms,"

Two beloved and respected friends in Christ have passed away recently in the Heart of Texas Association. As I write, many of us are **grieving the loss of Jan Trimmer on June 14th, and we mourn the loss of Rev. Ray Bizer** on May 15th. The lives of both Jan and Ray will have been celebrated in services in June -- at Hope United and Friedens Washington for Jan and at Faith UCC New Braunfels for Ray.

Jan, whose husband Ron is the pastor of Hope United in Georgetown and the former pastor of Friedens Church of Washington, served the church faithfully in many ways, both at Hope and Friedens. She grew up both in Houston and in Washington, and was confirmed and married to Ron at Friedens. She and Ron adopted their sons Ben and Aaron while they were still in Washington, and moved with them to Georgetown with a commitment of faith to start Hope United. Jan was a dedicated elementary school teacher for many years in Navasota and Georgetown, retiring this past spring as her long and courageous battle with cancer was coming to an end. With her family, we invite those who wish to give a memorial to Jan's life to send it to Hope United.

Ray was the Pastor Emeritus of Faith UCC New Braunfels and the Director Emeritus of Slumber Falls Camp, serving in ministry for 74 years with his wife, Emma Lou (who passed away in 2017) as a faithful and creative partner. In that work, he touched lives in countless ways. Many of us have stayed in the Bizer Retreat Center at Slumber Falls, one of the fruits of Ray's ministry there.
