Our Theology of Place Emphasis for February is the geology of this area. Psalm 19:1 declares, "The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims [God's] handiwork." As part of our exploration of the geology of this area we will take a guided tour of the Canyon Lake Gorge which was formed in 2002 over a three day period when the spillway overflowed due to a massive flood. It exposed the limestone bedrock. Fossils and Dinosaur footprints formed 110 million years ago can be observed in the rock. Today springs feed ponds and streams.

New Braunfels is located on the largest spring in Texas, the Comal! The springs along the Balcones Escarpment have attracted people for thousands of years, including the first German settlers in the mid 1800's. Archeologists have uncovered evidence at the Headwaters of the Comal that Native Americans as far back as 8,000 years ago camped at these springs! Further investigation may push the date or human habitation at the Comal Springs even further back!

Just to put this in perspective. Estimates place Abraham and Sarah about 2,000 BCE, or about 4,000 years ago. The pyramids of ancient Egypt go back to about 2500 BCE. Stonehenge is estimated to go back to 3,000 BCE., or about 5,000 years ago. Water is necessary for life. The Comal springs have been attracting people both ancient and modern to this area for millennia!

Our program after the potluck on Sunday, February 24th will be on the Edwards Aquifer. Athena Hessong writes, "Unbeknownst to many in the Texas Hill Country, the ground beneath their feet holds the life of the area. The Edwards Aquifer literally is the life blood of the Hill Country. In fact, this area would not have grown to what it is today without the aquifer. Cities like San Antonio [and New Braunfels] have long depended on the Edwards Aquifer for water, making it an integral part of the environment and geology of the region. But, it could be in trouble, and water supplies might be at risk in the future."

What might the rocks and the geology be saying to us today?

Canyon Lake Gorge Tour on Saturday, February 23rd at 2 p.m.

Faith Church will have a private, guided tour of the Canyon Lake Gorge at 2 p.m. on Saturday,



February 23rd. If you would like to go please sign up on the kiosk. The maximum number that can go is 23 and we already have 13 signed up! Be aware that this is a 3 hour tour over a mile of rocky ground. You must be 7 or above to go. The cost is \$10.

We will meet at the church parking lot at 1 p.m. and leave the parking lot at 1:15 p.m. Please wear appropriate footwear: sneakers or hiking boots. Note shoes will likely get

muddy. Bring a bottle of water with you and snacks if you want. A small backpack for these is advisable or large pockets, so your hands can free. Wearing sunscreen and a hat is a good idea. If rain is likely the trip will be canceled. No fossil collecting or pets are allowed.

4th Sunday Potluck on February 24th After Church



This will be the first of our Theology of Place monthly potlucks and programs. To kick things off Ms. Sarah Valdez from the Edwards Aquifer Authority will be here to present a program on the aquifer. Sarah Valdez is the EAA's Education Coordinator. I. Sarah has been an educator for more than 20 years with experience in classrooms, nature centers and museums. She has a Bachelor of Science in environmental studies from Southwest Texas State University and a Master of Education from Texas State University.

Looking Ahead to March

On Saturday, March 23 we will have a guided tour of the Lindheimer Home. at 11 a.m. There is a suggested donation of \$1.50 for the tour. Ferdinand Lindheimer is known as "The Father of Texas



Botany". He moved to New Braunfels in 1845. He is recognized internationally for his work and 41 trees and plants bear his name. More on this later.

On Sunday, March 24 Deedy Wright from the New Braunfel's Native Plant Society will present a program on Native Plants, their importance and how to cultivate them.

SOS Food Bank Board Notes

In the year 2018, SOS gave food to 3,964 families (9,884 individuals) totaling 243,525 lbs. Nice! And, we finished the year in the black, vs. in the red in 2017, mainly due to stopping the Arlen's food coupons. One of the things we'll be doing this year (since we haven't been able to get it donated from SA Food Bank) is purchasing hamburger meat. Many clients ask for it, and we haven't been able to provide it for them.

SOS is planning to build a portable building like the temporary one we had last year, to accommodate food drives, etc.

For churches that donate food (including us), they asked that we try to donate nutritious food, esp. carrots, mixed vegetables, regular spaghetti, regular mac & cheese, etc. Please try not to donate cake mixes, pie mixes as they expire and go rancid quickly and are far less nutritious.

Whole turkeys and hams are still free to large families (4-5 people); they do not count towards the 3 lbs. per person limit, but MUST be counted in the total weight given to the families. We need to account for every pound that comes in (freebie or not)

We already do this, but each church should clean up, sweep, stock shelves, etc. during idle times. We are very good about this.

For those taking applications please do not put the begin or end date in the computer app. that will be done when they are certified. When entering returning families, always check the end date of their application! Some are not doing this. ALWAYS save the information before leaving their information. It was strongly suggested to ask if anyone else in the family has gotten food this month. I guess some are double-dipping?

We must ALWAYS get a client signature, preferably both on paperwork and the tablet. Very important.

Heart of Texas Association News

Our Heart of Texas Association Spring Meeting is going to bring an opportunity to spend

time on the beach for those who come and stay overnight, along with a new way to meet for those who cannot physically be present. Our host, who has extended a gracious and enthusiastic invitation, will be **St. Paul UCC**, 5525 Lipes Blvd., in **Corpus Christi** on **Saturday**, **May 4th, at 11 am.** As usual, our meeting will include lunch. We hope many of you will plan to come to be with our very welcoming brothers and sisters in Christ at St. Paul, and will also plan to spend some time enjoying Corpus Christi.

This particular spring meeting will be a first for us in that we are planning to have a way to attend by video conference, recognizing that the distance will keep some from coming. Our Association

Constitution and By Laws were composed very intentionally as we formed to allow for this kind of attendance, knowing that we would be dealing with significant distances for our meetings. We anticipate having an **Ecclesiastical Council at our Spring Meeting**. It will be important as we review our candidate for ministry to ensure that we have a quorum for our vote on approval for ordination, where a quorum is attendance from majority of our churches. We anticipate setting up a video conference on an online, easy to use platform like Zoom, as well as having a way for those who will be attending online to have a "test run" login sometime before the meeting. (I know from experience that we need to get our online attendees to try it beforehand to ensure that sound and video work for everyone.) As we get this set up, we will be sending out more information about the what, where, when, and how to do a trial login and how to join the meeting on May 4th.

St Paul UCC in Corpus Christi, our host church, is eagerly awaiting the arrival of their new settled (permanent) minister after the past interim year. Rev. Dana Worsham will be arriving in early February, leading worship beginning on February 10th. Dana comes to St. Paul from the Atlanta, Georgia area, where she attended seminary and served a church. She is an ordained Disciples of Christ minister with a background of military service. We look forward to welcoming Dana to the UCC and to the Heart of Texas Association.

Many thanks to Carl Schwartz-King for leading our boundary training for ministers at Bethany Congregational Church in San Antonio on Saturday, January 12th. Carl is the Licensed Minister of Congregational Care at United Christian in Austin. He has been trained by the Faith Trust Institute to lead boundary training in the South Central Conference, and gives his time in this ministry. Boundary training, for those who are unfamiliar with the term, helps ministers understand and reflect together on the maintaining of appropriate boundaries in the areas of handling money, friendships in the church, sexual relationships, ministry to people in churches the minister no longer serves, and other areas of ministry that require maintaining appropriate boundaries. The Heart of Texas Association requires our ministers (except those completely retired from serving churches or other ministries) to complete this training every five years. We do this as a commitment to our members and ministers, seeking to provide ministry that honors our faith as Christians, and we invite all to support our pastors in this commitment.
